April is a big month in the greater Oxford area! Oxford is a prime viewing spot for the April 8th total solar eclipse and the City of Oxford and multiple community partners have been hard at work planning the **Total Eclipse of the Parks** event series to commemorate the occasion. Some folks are wondering about the meaning behind "Total Eclipse of the Parks" and why there are community members (especially those in their 40's and 50's) who start singing "Turn around..." when they hear it mentioned.

The name is a play on words of a popular song released in 1983 by recording artist Bonnie Tyler titled, "Total Eclipse of the Heart (Turn Around)". It was a #1 hit in the U.S. and has been featured in many movies and TV shows throughout the years since its release.



Safety

When the eclipse is not in totality, **eclipse safety glasses must be worn** when looking at the Sun! Eclipse safety glasses are not just any sunglasses: regular sunglasses, no matter how dark, are **not** safe for viewing the sun. If glasses meet the safety standards, they should have "**ISO 12312-2**" printed on them. Proper handheld eclipse viewers should have the same indication.

Free eclipse safety glasses will be distributed at Total Eclipse of the Parks events.

Reminders



The Butler County Emergency Management Agency predicts that Butler County will see 500,000 to 700,000 visitors during the eclipse. Some careful planning can limit any inconveniences this influx of visitors may cause so that all can fully embrace the magic of the eclipse.

2 - 4 weeks before the eclipse:

- Stock up on groceries, gas, and supplies.
- Make plans for communication with family and friends on April 8th. A high volume of cellular activity could cause limited service.

April 6th - 8th:

- Give yourself more time to get places to account for traffic. Know the schedule of events so that you can avoid areas where there could be delays.
- Be patient with local businesses and visitors!

Q&A

What is a solar eclipse?

On April 8th, 2024, a total solar eclipse will cross North America - this happens when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, completely blocking the face of the Sun. The sky will become completely dark, as if it were dawn or dusk.

What does it mean to be in the path of totality?

When you hear "the path of totality" it is referring to any location where observers will see the Moon completely cover the Sun.

Where can you view the solar eclipse?

Only 15 lucky U.S. states will be in the path of totality, including Ohio. Butler County is the best spot to view the eclipse and experience totality in the Cincinnati region!
