Phase 1 Vaccination Distribution Plan

(COLUMBUS, Ohio) 12/4/2020 — Ohio Governor Mike DeWine announced on 12/4/2020 details for Ohio's first phase of vaccine distribution that is expected to begin on or around December 15. During Phase 1, vaccine supply will be limited, and Ohio will focus on vaccinating those who wish to be vaccinated in the critical Phase 1A groups. The federal government has advised that the Ohio Department of Health will not know the exact number of vaccines that will be shipped to Ohio until closer to each shipment date. The current shipment figures, which are subject to change, are as follows:

- On or around December 15, a shipment from Pfizer will include 9,750
 vaccines for Ohio's 10 prepositioned hospital sites. An additional 88,725
 vaccines will go to Walgreens and CVS for congregate care settings.
- On or around December 22, a shipment of 201,000 vaccines is expected from Moderna. These vaccines will go to 98 hospitals for vaccination of those who are exposed to COVID patients and to 108 health departments to vaccinate other frontline workers such as those working in emergency medical services.
- On or around December 22, another shipment is also expected from Pfizer.
 The tentative number of vaccines in this shipment is 123,000. These
 vaccines will go to Walgreens and CVS for vaccination of those in
 congregate care settings.
- A few days later, Ohio expects another 148,000 vaccines from Pfizer and 89,000 vaccines from Moderna.

These vaccines will be the first dose for those in the identified critical groups. A second dose will be delivered and administered in the future. It has not been determined when members of the general public will have the option to receive vaccines. As information becomes available about the next phases of vaccine distribution, it will be made public.

CITY OF OXFORD UPDATES

Service - Leaf Pick Up Program to Conclude for the Season

The leaf pick up service from the street gutters will conclude on Friday, December 11, 2020. Any additional leaves must be bagged in approved yard waste bags and placed at the curb on yard waste pick up days.

Service- Christmas Tree Recycling

Beginning December 21, 2020 Oxford residents may place live Christmas trees at the curbside for disposal on regularly scheduled refuse collection days. Trees will be picked up and recycled by the City of Oxford Streets and Maintenance Division. No yard waste tags are required for this service. Residents are asked to remove ALL decorations from the tree prior to setting the tree at the curbside. This holiday service does not include wreaths or garland. Questions? Call the Streets and Maintenance Division at 523-8412. This seasonal service will conclude by January 29, 2021.

Shop Healthy at MOON Co-op Natural Grocery and Cafe

Oxford Moon Co-op will remind you of a "Mom-and-Pop" store from the past. "We want to take you back to a kinder, gentler time in American business, before all the hustle and bustle." says Store Manager Tom Swing. Don't be surprised if the cashier remembers your name and greets you personally when you walk in. The store has a full line of groceries, beautiful produce, bulk foods, frozen, wine, locally made bread and bakery items, dairy, and meat. Priority is given to products that are grown, raised, or made locally, so shopping at MOON helps support Oxford-area growers and producers. MOON Co-op also offers gift certificates.

During the COVID-19 emergency, the number of shoppers in the store is limited to 10. The staff sanitizes surfaces frequently, and sanitizing supplies are available for customers at the door. Given the unique character of the Co-op store, shoppers are very respectful and caring for one another. The small size and efficient layout of the store helps shoppers find what they need and checkout quickly.

The store is cooperatively owned by over 800 Oxford-area households, though everyone is welcome to shop there. It is located at 512 S. Locust Street (the landscaped courtyard of Tollgate Mall), between Little Caesars and Armstrong Cleaners. The store's phone is 280-5020 and it is open Monday-Saturday 9 a.m.-8 p.m. and Sunday 10 a.m.- 6 p.m.
